The past year 2021 has been extremely challenging. Most of us have felt the painful touch of COVID whether for ourselves or with our families and friends. San Andres, Providencia and Santa Catalina have had to start the process of rebuilding after being devastated by two hurricanes, Eta and Iota of categories 4 & 5 respectively. St. Vincent suffered the eruption of the La Soufriere volcano and some of our women had to overcome health challenges. However, regardless of the many challenges faced we can all declare, "Ebenezer, Hitherto hath the LORD helped us." 1 Samuel 7:12. Two of our young women were given scholarships to pursue a nine-month Global Leadership training with Uptick BWA Global Women.



CBWU Connection

This year the CBWU Connection celebrates its tenth year in circulation. We reached out to Sis Karlene Edwards-Warrick, the first chair of the editorial committee, to find out how it all started. She recalled being at a Conference meeting in July, 2011 when then President of the Caribbean Baptist Women's Union (CBWU), Ms. Yvonne Pitter expressed the desire to have the women of the Caribbean connect through a newsletter. Sister Pitter needed someone to pioneer that initiative and called on Sister Edwards-Warrick not once but three times to answer that call. Sister Edwards-Warrick, now president of the CBWU, remembers being nudged on the third call and encouraged to respond; which she did, in the negative. She said, "I was faced with many challenges at the time and I felt I had a lot of responsibilities." Sister Pitter, however, did not accept her decline and although she attempted to meet Sister Pitter privately to provide reasons for declining, the opportunity never arose.

She was given six months to recruit an editorial team for the expected launch in January, 2012. During this time, although faced with more challenges with the passing of both her father and brother, Sister Edwards-Warrick was able to get six persons involved; five female and one male. She recalled their diversity and their dynamism. "Some of them," she said, "came with media experience." They worked well together and in January, 2012 the CBWU Connection was launched. Since then, two issues have been published per year; one in January and the other in the month of July. To God be the glory!!!

Believers as Conquerors

1 John 5:4-5

John's epistles were written at a time when "The world" was the domain of the Caesar's. There was not a force on earth (except that of which John wrote) which could stand against Rome. Durant summed up the terrible conflict that lasted nearly a quarter of a millennium with the words, "Caesar and Christ had met in the arena, and Christ had won." Christ won the battle, therefore, as His followers we too must place our faith and trust in Him if we are to be victorious.

How strong and victorious is faith in Jesus? Strong enough to overcome the world! At times in life, certain circumstances are not seen for how complex they really are. At other times, people tend to completely overcomplicate matters. John sought to cut through any complications related to standing fast in a world hostile to the gospel by reassuring his readers that their belief in Jesus as God's Son meant absolutely everything for their spiritual victory in the present age.

Let us now focus on Believers as Conquerors.

Discussion Questions

In what way do members/friends of the Caribbean Baptist Women's Union conquer the Caribbean?

How do we become victorious?

How can faith accomplish this?

Considering the fact that our region has never been primarily Christian and that even now it seems to be growing more sinful, how can this passage be understood?

Cross-References

Romans 8:37 – No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us.

2 Corinthians 2:14 – But thanks be to God, who always leads us as captives in Christ's triumphal procession and uses us to spread the aroma of the knowledge of him everywhere.

Teaching Points

1. Born. This is a word often used in the Bible to describe our relationship with God after salvation. It conveys a new beginning, a new life, a complete change of direction. It also shows that we have a Father, God. Because we are "born of God" we should also be like God. Like Father, like son, right?

2. Conquers the world –Many politicians and super powers throughout history have actually tried to be in control of their citizens and other countries. At times they have been successful. For Christians, on the other hand, this is not the way. There are actually more ways than one to conquer.

3. Entertainment has had a major influence on our young people. Young people are much more loose morally than before and it is extremely common to live together prior to marriage in most countries. Materialism is also firmly entrenched. We have lost so much of our moral compass.

4. This is the type of conquering John is referring to. Not long after his time Christians were persecuted severely by the Roman Empire. But they didn't give up the faith. They didn't compromise. The faith of Christians conquered what could have never been won through military efforts.

We are fighting a battle against spiritual forces of wickedness and we are on God's side. He has won the battle. His enemies just don't realize it yet. We are victorious the instant we choose to believe in Christ. There are several possible applications from this:

- Live like a conqueror meaning that you should not be afraid of culture not giving in to persecution and temptation.

Breast Cancer Awareness

Breast Cancer has affected and continues to affect women in Guyana and around the world.

The GMBC has

decided to embrace the cause and take action by scheduling annual Breast Cancer Awareness (BCA) Services and Forum. These are ways to further sensitize women and men of this disease, during National Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

According to World Health Organization (WHO), breast cancer is accounting for 25 percent of female cancers worldwide. Despite the advances in diagnosis and treatment, this condition is still the leading cause of death for women. However, a decline in deaths worldwide is evident today.

Guyana's statistics show that a significant number of women within their thirties are affected by breast cancer. This is of great concern to the Ministry of Health and the country as a whole. The month of October highlights, brings awareness, sensitizes and educates persons about breast cancer.

On Sunday October 22, 2021, Women in God's Service (WINGS) of the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, a GMBC congregation, held a special church service in observance of breast cancer. Church members in attendance wore their pink t-shirts and made monetary donations to show their support to a mother who is recovering from this dreaded disease. This mother was our special guest at the church service. Intercessory prayers were offered on her behalf and she was presented with a food basket and a financial token to assist with her expenses.

Dr. Denecia Williams from Calvary Baptist Church, another GMBC congregation, delivered the sermon which was taken from Ezekiel 37:1-14. Dr. Williams gave a detailed explanation of how cancer is formed and expounded on God's ability to heal and change any situation.

At the GMBC WINGS Virtual Forum held on October 30, 2021, participants showed their support for persons affected by breast cancer. Participants were reminded by the guest speaker Dr. Deborah Johnson, a medical internist from Greensboro North

Carolina, USA, to do a self-examination and if a lump is detected in the breast to consult a doctor. Other pertinent information was given to put into practice and was well received as breast cancer can be treated successfully if diagnosed early. We were reminded that programs, screening, and treatment are now readily available. A video presentation was viewed which showed us how to do a self-examination. An appeal was made for everyone to make changes to their lifestyles and diet.

GMBC encourages everyone to take breast cancer awareness seriously, be very observant of changes in the body, and support persons who are battling breast cancer. Giving words of encouragement, reading the scripture, providing spiritual and material assistance can give comfort and lead to a better life.

The Importance of a God-Centred Self-Care

To say that the last two years has been challenging is an understatement. The pandemic has disrupted lives in ways that no one could have predicted, with research showing women throughout the world shouldering most of the burden of the fallout. This has resulted in increased stress levels and negative impacts on their health and wellbeing. Women are overrepresented in frontline roles, with over 60% working in numerous fields. Women, the foundation of their families, are caring for children, older family members and fulfilling numerous domestic obligations. They are the bedrock of society, support their communities through their churches, charitable work and advocacy. In this pandemic period all these professional, domestic and societal demands have been exacerbated.

This new year is the perfect time for reflection and the exploration of methods to bring back some level of balance in daily living, so that we have the mental space and capacity to fulfil our God-given purpose through self-care.

What is Self-Care?

Self-care has been defined as the decisions and actions we take independent of healthcare professionals to better manage our daily challenges, and thus improve our health and wellbeing. When many of us think about self-care, the stereotypical image of a woman in a robe, a towel wrapped around her hair and sipping a latte in a spa, probably comes to mind. Whilst this type of alone-time is important, our self-care must go beyond, and be God-centred and holistic; addressing the needs of body, soul and spirit.

Types of Self-Care

In this article we will focus on the following areas of self-care: **Spiritual, Physical and Emotional.**

Spiritual Self-Care

Spiritual self-care is the foundation for Christian women. It begins with evaluating our

relationship with God and taking steps to form a deeper connection with Him, achieved by daily quality time in God's presence; reading, learning and meditating on His word, praying and seeking His guidance, and expressing gratitude for all that He has done.

Physical Self-Care

1 Corinthians 6: 19-20: Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit ... So, glorify God in your body.

Physical self-care focuses on the steps taken to improve physical health. Our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit therefore, it is important to have a healthy nutritious diet, regular exercise, adequate rest and regular health checks.

Emotional Self-Care

2 Timothy 1: 7: For God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control.

Understanding the root cause of our emotional upheavals, and addressing them is equally important. Part of this process calls us to remember that we can achieve positive qualities such as peace, love and self-control through our walk with Christ. Additionally, when our emotions become too overwhelming, we ought to be courageous enough to seek help; whether mental health support from a counsellor, or familial or pastoral support.

A leadership training workshop was conducted by Sister Karlene Edwards-Warrick, President, CBWU on August 21, 2021 entitled "The Calm Within the Storm". This was in an effort to help the CBWU women to cope with the impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic. These are some of the highlights.

Life storms symbolize chaos, trauma, difficulty, weakness and depression – all of which are inevitable and which impact the natural course of life. In times of storms/crisis, research has shown that ten percent of people blame others, eighty percent do nothing and ten percent emerge as leaders.

How should we lead in times of storm?

The Six Cs

1. Be Cautious
2. Be Compassionate
3. Be Curious
4. Be Creative
5. Be Courageous
6. Communicate

Participants at the workshop were broken up into groups and these are some of the ideas which evolved using the Six Cs.

- We can become creative by engaging in backyard gardening, sharing devotions, using the telephone directory to evangelise, making gifts to share the love of God and having 'drive-thru' prayers.
- Creativity can also be found in stress relievers, using leftovers in unique recipes, acting out scriptures, using online resources and sharing scriptures to

help the needy.

- Communication can be continued via WhatsApp, individually and in groups. Prayer partners can also utilise this medium.
- The Zoom platform can be used for Bible studies, movie/quiz/ games/ testimony night.
- Smaller groups can be created and personal visits can be made to those who have not yet or may not be able to embrace the social media.
- New ideas can be used for evangelising like flyers and wearing face masks which showcase scriptures.

What do we do in times of testing?

- Accept our storms like eagles; the only bird that loves storms.
- Know that storms are temporary.
- Storms provide opportunity for change and transition.
- Scriptures for use during storms – Ps. 46:13; John 14:1; Php. 4:6; Ecc. 3:1.




Hot Cross Buns

Ingredients

Glaze

- 1 lb/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 oz/¼ cup sugar
- 2 oz/¼ cup softened butter/margarine
- 2 oz/¼ cup water
- 2 oz/¼ cup sugar
- 8 oz/1 cup warm milk
- 8 oz/½ cup mixed dried fruits/cake fruits mix
- 1 envelope/1 tbsp instant yeast
- 1 large egg
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp ground/grated nutmeg
- ½ tsp allspice/ground mace
- 1 tsp vanilla extract/essence
- ½ tsp salt

Directions

In a large bowl sift flour then mix with spices, salt, and sugar.

Rub butter or margarine into the flour mixture, add dried fruits/cake fruits mix and combine well.

In a medium bowl whisk together warm milk, egg, and vanilla extract.


Add yeast and liquid ingredients gradually, mix to a soft dough, just firm enough to be shaped after it has risen. Knead the dough well until it is smooth.

Place in a greased bowl, leave to rise, covered with a kitchen towel or plastic wrap in a warm place for 45 minutes to 1 hr or until doubled in size. Preheat oven to 375°.



Knead and shape into 8-10 balls, place apart on a greased baking sheet, flatten slightly and make a deep X or cross on top with a knife. Cover and allow to rise again for 15 minutes. Place in a hot oven to bake for about 20 minutes or until brown.

Make a glaze with sugar and water. Brush over each bun with glaze soon after removing it from the oven.
